Get ready to move!

Wandsworth Moves Together is the council's plan to get everyone moving more – including young people.

Research shows one in three children do not get the recommended levels of activity.

As part of **Access for All,** the new plan will make it easier to access local services and opportunities, including:

- Free swimming for all children on free school meals
- Free use of council gyms, swimming pools, tennis courts, padel courts and other sports facilities for eligible children and adults.
- A dedicated taskforce to focus on women and girls in sport







Welcome to Wandsworth's newest Family Hub

The Roehampton Family Hub is a brand-new service where every family, every parent and every young person can access vital free services under one roof.

Come along for services including childcare support, employment advice and mental health services. There's also a dedicated youth room and IT area, equipped with upgraded wi-fi, where residents can study, job search, or simply browse online.

It's one of the first major improvements promised as part of the Alton Renewal Plan which sets out how Wandsworth Council is investing in the Roehampton community and its future.

Residents on the other side of the borough can visit the Battersea Family Hub at the Yvonne Carr centre, Thessaly Road.

Summer of fun

Summer may seem a long time ago, but here's a reminder of all the fun that went on at this summer's Wandsworth Connected scheme.

Wandsworth Connected, Wandsworth's Holiday Activity and Food (HAF) programme, is delivered by groups all over the borough and is for children on free school meals. As well as activities, children received lunch. The next scheme is at Christmas.





New school building for local students

St George's Primary School in Battersea is getting ready to expand into a new purpose built school from 2026.

The building will increase capacity for the borough's SEND pupils, with a 16-place Social, Emotional and Mental Health specialist base. The building will have capacity for 420 children aged between 5 and 11 in mainstream education, as well as a stand-alone nursery for 52 children and facilities for the community.

A new flexible community space will also be part of the building, connecting communities and providing a new venue for local residents, children and groups to meet and take part in activities. The community hub will also house an

indoor sports hall and outdoor multi-use games area. The state-of-the-art school building will be one of the most sustainable in Wandsworth and one of the most energy efficient in the country.

Council leader Simon Hogg said: "It's a priority for us to ensure that the new school building will provide accessible and inclusive educational opportunities for local children so they can stay at school within their local community whatever their needs."

Sarah Collymore, Headteacher at St George's CE Primary School said: "2026 is the school's 200th anniversary so a new building feels like a really great way to celebrate 200 years of serving the local community – as well as giving us so many more opportunities to serve more families."

The new building is part of the council's investment in local SEND provision so that more specialist placements can be provided close to home.

Councillor Kate Stock, Wandsworth Lead Cabinet for Children said: "As a council, we are committed to ensuring that children with special educational needs have access to high quality local provision, keeping them close to their family and friends."

The new site is due to be finished next year, ready for students in September 2025.



Battersea-based school Ark John Archer Primary Academy has partnered with UK charity FoodCycle to serve up free meals made from surplus fruit and vegetables.

Since May the pilot project has served more than 600 three-course meals and saved 1.3m tonnes of food from going to landfill.

Other projects are going on in schools across

the borough to increase access to healthy food. In June many Wandsworth Schools joined the British Nutrition Foundation campaign 'Healthy Eating Week'. During the week, schools tapped into many downloadable resources to raise awareness of healthy eating.

And since September twice as many primary schools are taking part in the council's free breakfast scheme, run with the charity Magic Breakfast.



Thanks to a pioneering partnership with Apple, Wandsworth Council has helped hundreds of primary school children to learn new skills.

Students have gained confidence and skills including how to code websites, use new tech tools such as Apple Pencil and develop their all-round digital skills.

The Battersea Project is now set to increase from 11 to 20 schools, supported by Apple's Community Education Initiative and Wandsworth charity Business and Education Succeeding Together.

Apple, which moved its UK headquarters to Battersea in 2022, shone the spotlight on its successful partnership with Wandsworth Council in its annual global report on the company's impact on education.



Burntwood dives into Olympic action

Teachers and pupils at Burntwood School got close to the action this summer as they got involved in the Paris Olympics.

Three teachers, Miss Potter, Miss Siemak and Miss Matthews, leant their scuba diving skills to a specialist team installing cameras and robotics for photo agencies including Getty and Reuters.

Meanwhile Year 11 student Maya shone as a Young Presenter on the Sky weekly news show. She captured the pre-Olympic excitement and met several young Team GB athletes.



She said: "I had the opportunity to interview the phenomenal swimmer Eva Okara, the brilliant archer Megan Havers, and the outstanding gymnasts Harry Hepburn and Abi Martin.

These athletes really taught me the lesson that truly anything is possible if you put your mind to it - even doing your GCSEs whilst being an Olympic athlete!"



Pupils meet top authors

Over 3,000 local children met some of their favourite authors and illustrators when the Barnes Children's Literature Festival's free Primary Schools Programme came to Wandsworth. Pupils from 30 local primary schools attended events at the Battersea Arts Centre and Wandsworth Civic Suite. They met Waterstones Children's Book Prize winner, Dapo Adeola, Blue Peter Children's Book Prize winner Vashti Hardy, and the authors of the mega bestselling Dragon Realm series, Katie and Kevin Tsang, among others. The Primary Schools Programme will be returning to Wandsworth in June 2025



Using drama to keep children safe

Loudmouth Theatre in Education has been touring Wandsworth schools helping young people explore difficult issues.

Children in Years 4-6 looked at issues of child exploitation, abuse and online safety. Secondary school children explored child exploitation, county lines, grooming, modern slavery and trafficking. Older children also looked at issues around harmful sexual behaviours.

Making STEM fun

Young people have been getting handson learning in STEM subjects.

The council's keen to make sure young people get the skills they need to explore careers based on the STEM subjects of science, technology, engineering, art and maths.

Pyrotechnician Matthew Tosh of Titanium Fireworks, the company that provided the fireworks for the Battersea Park display, visited St. Mary's RC Primary School, Sacred Heart RC Primary School, and St. George's CoE Primary School with the "Real STEM or Just Bangs?" workshop.

He took students behind the scenes of the famous Battersea display, revealing how STEM (science, technology, engineering, and mathematics) forms the backbone of every professional firework show.







Musical inspiration

This summer children at St George's, Sacred Heart, St Mary's RC, Christ Church, and Falconbrook Primary Schools were visited by members of the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra.

Around 600 young people took part in workshops to learn about classical music and instruments and create their own pieces of music. Workshops were also held at Wandsworth's Big Play Out summer holiday programme.

Wandsworth Council and Enable worked with RPO Resound, the orchestra's community and education branch, as part of the Battersea Park in Concert performances this summer.


WINNER Key Stage 2


The target of School Streets outside more than half of all Wandsworth schools has been reached.

Recent installations mean the council has succeeded in installing school streets in more than 50 per cent of primary schools.

Road markings outside 54 schools are also being repainted to make them clearer for drivers and safer for children.

The School Streets scheme temporarily closes roads near school entrances to motor traffic during drop-off and pick-up times, helping to reduce congestion, cut pollution, and create safer, more welcoming environments for children and families.

Lisa Platts, Headteacher at St Boniface RC Primary School in Tooting said: "For a number of years we've had concerns about the health and safety of the children in our street. Children have really benefited from having a much quieter environment to start and finish their school day."

Joseph Coelho inspires Wandsworth pupils


Award-winning author, poet and former children's laureate, Joseph Coelho has inspired more than 1,000 young people with a series of poetry performances.

He returned to his home borough last month to share his writing journey and inspirations and while here he reflected on Black History Month. "Seeing greater representation within the writing world is hugely important to me," explains Joseph, who spent his early childhood living in the Alton West.

"I feel very passionate now about including all sorts of people and families and backgrounds within my own work, within my own poems and stories, so that every child gets the opportunity to see themselves reflected."

Now living in Scotland, Joseph's deep connection to his childhood home remains and he was a key supporter of Wandsworth's successful bid to become London Borough of Culture 2025. "As a child growing up in Roehampton, it was hugely

important that I had access to books and writing," he adds.

The session included fun exercises such as star jumps, running on the spot, and burpees, encouraging children to get active and enjoy movement.

Following the workout, Joe hosted a Q&A session, where students were free to ask him questions about fitness, health, and his own journey.

Thomas Roca, aged 9, remembers staying active with Joe during lockdown:

"I watched Joe Wicks in lockdown, and I did the workouts every day, so I loved seeing him in our playground. I liked doing the jumping jacks and the silly dances. It was a great experience and I loved it."
