I'd like to assure you schools have have robust measures in place to tackle any incidents of Coronavirus among students or staff. There has been a handful of cases so far, but these are being swiftly dealt with and we're working closely with all our schools to ensure children are safe.

Keeping you safe

Here's what your school is doing to keep you safe during the Coronavirus pandemic

- Year group bubbles
- One-way systems
- Social distancing in classrooms, with some desks kept empty
- Hand sanitising stations
- Extra cleaning
- Staggered arrival and departure, break and lunch times
- No mixed-year or whole school assemblies
- After-school clubs will be run safely following national guidance

Here's what you can do

Wash your hands thoroughly and frequently

Don't touch or hug people. This can be tough but hugging people outside your family can spread the virus

Following the one-way systems and social distancing measures set out by your school

Walk to school if you can – see more on p14 about safe travel to school

If you feel ill, let a teacher know – especially if you have one of these symptoms

- High temperature
- Loss of, or change in, your normal sense of taste and smell
- Persistent cough.

Isolated cases of Covid are to be expected and have been planned for, so there's no need to panic if you hear about one in your school. Someone with symptoms will be sent home and they and their family asked to self-isolate and take a test.



The S.M.I.L.E-ing Boys project

The S.M.I.L.E-ing Boys project is a mental wellbeing project for Black boys in London. The project uses photography, poetry, film and discussions to empower the young boys to develop emotional intelligence and best manage their mental health in positive ways.

It's part of the council's Wandsworth Arts Fringe with funding from the Wellcome Trust and Arts Council England. See it on noticeboards by the river opposite the US Embassy, at the junction of Condell Road and Thessaly Road, and under the railway bridge opposite Battersea Dogs and Cats Home.

Keeping creative

A partnership between the council and Wandsworth's creative organisations has seen around two and a half thousand art kits distributed to local children during the summer holidays to help young people play, create and make

The project brings together Agora Arts Circle, Battersea Arts Centre, Love To Learn, Nine Elms Arts Ministry, Roehampton R.O.C.K.S, Royal College of Art, Creative Wandsworth, SenTalk, Tara Arts, 575 Wandsworth Road (National Trust) and Wandsworth Council as well as a dedicated group of volunteers.

Creat and Learn Play Kits include basic craft materials, a booklet of 14 creative activities and a newsletter signposting families to other arts activities online. The kits include work by local artists, organisations and RCA graduates.

From trees to thrones

Children at **Griffin** and **St George's** primary schools in Nine Elms are eagerly awaiting the unveiling of wooden storytelling 'thrones' carved from trees felled during roadworks on nearby Battersea Park Road. As part of the Wandsworth Council project, pupils sent their hand-drawn inspiration to woodcarvers Stephen Stockbridge and Morganico who will reveal the finished furniture in October.

Art gold

Swaffield School has received a prestigious Artsmark Award at Gold level.

Artsmark is accredited by Arts Council England. The Artsmark assessor commended Swaffield School for its continuing commitment to providing a wide range of high-quality and authentic arts and cultural experiences for pupils and praised it for providing a wide range of opportunities for pupils to showcase their work.

£15m investment in school expansions

Chestnut Grove Academy in Balham and **St Cecilia's** in Southfields are next in line to be expanded as part of a £15m-plus investment on providing more classroom places in Wandsworth.

Designs are now being drawn up with an anticipated completion date for both schemes in the late summer/ autumn of 2021.

St Cecilia's will increase its intake by one extra class and add an extra 50 sixth form places. **Chestnut Grove** will increase admissions by the equivalent of 1.5 classes and expand its sixth form provision by 50 places.

Once these expansions are complete, plans for Putney's Ashcroft Technology Academy will allow it to permanently increase its intake by an additional class. In June expansions plans at Ark Putney Academy were completed, enabling the school to add two new classes to its intake and expand its sixth form provision by a further 50 places.

Earlier phases of the scheme have seen expansion at **Burntwood**, **Graveney** and **Brandlehow** schools. Additional resources have also been invested in special educational needs provision at **Greenmead** School and there is also £2m programme of annual capital investment to replace heating systems, roofs, windows, fire alarms and other pieces of school infrastructure.

The council's Youth4Climate poster competition has found its winner!

Frank McKeever from Ark Bolingbroke Academy received £100 for his 'Wandsworth Underwater' piece which has been turned into a poster and displayed all over the borough at the council's various advertising spaces.

Dejanae Oakley Joseph from Richmond upon Thames College came in second place and Matilda Chisolm from Lady Margaret School has come in third place, they have each received £50.

This is the first year of the Youth4Climate competition which seeks to engage the young people of Wandsworth in the critical topic of climate change as well as give them a platform for to have their talent seen and opinions heard.

Judging the competition was CEO of Battersea Arts Centre, Tarek Iskander, Plogolution founders Michelle Parkes and Dermot Kavanagh as well as Cllr Louise Calland.

How to protect yourself

The council and local police have teamed up to help keep young people safe on the streets. Here's some advice.

Look confident: You are less likely to be targeted if you move with purpose and are aware of your surroundings.

Know where you're going: Keep to busy, well-lit streets, walkways and paths which are more likely to be covered by CCTV.

Hide it: Keep your mobile phone and valuables out of sight. If you're using your phone it's more likely to be snatched from your hand as you're not paying attention to your surroundings, so look around you.

Finally – and this is so important to remember – if you're threatened with violence, don't risk your personal safety. Property can be replaced, you can't.

reasons to vaccinate your child

1. Protect your child. The vaccine will help protect your child against flu and serious complications such as bronchitis and pneumonia

2. Protect you, your family and friends. Vaccinating your child will help protect more vulnerable family and friends

3. No injection needed. The nasal spray is painless and easy to have

4. It's better than having flu. The nasal spray helps protect against flu, has been given to millions of children worldwide and has an excellent safety record

5. Avoid costs. If your child gets flu, you may have to take time off work or arrange alternative childcare

What should I do?

Contact your child's GP if your child was aged two or three years old (on the 31 August of the current flu season) and you haven't heard from them by early November. If your child is at primary school or in year 7 of secondary school, the school will send you a leaflet and consent form. Please sign the form and return it. If your child has a health condition that puts them at greater risk from flu, or lives with someone on the NHS Shielded Patient List, they can get the flu vaccine from their GP.

Get your flu innoculation

This year all primary school children and Year 7 children will be offered the flu innoculation.

Flu kills thousands of people every year. It is an unpredictable virus and the vaccine is the best protection we have against it.

It's likely that the flu and Covid-19 will be circulating at the same time, so it's really important that young people get protected – to keep themselves well and to prevent passing the flu virus onto more vulnerable people who are elderly or who have long-term health conditions like diabetes. Catching flu could make them more vulnerable to catching Covid.

Your school will let you know about receiving the vaccine, or ask your GP.

Travel to school safely

Schools and the council are working together to make it easier for children to travel to school in safe, sustainable ways.

The safest way is outdoors by foot, bike or scooter. Cycle and scooter training sessions are available and an additional 16 school streets will be delivered over the next few weeks. These stop cars driving past schools at drop-off and pick-up time.

Extra cycle storage has been provided and schools are being supported to achieve gold School Travel Plans. These are plans that help schools set out how they will encourage walking, cycling, car sharing and other sustainable travel. A new scheme is also being set up to encourage teachers to cycle.

If you walk, parents are being asked not to stop and chat at the school gates and young people who use public transport are asked to be alert. If you are over 11 you must wear a mask.
