Alton Renewal Plan in action - Community Facilities



You said...

You wanted improved community facilities and better youth and family services.

Block A

We have been progressing the design work to develop proposals for new community and residential buildings (known as 'Block A') at the entrance to the estate, to deliver a state-of-the-art library, youth club, council offices, community spaces and new council homes.

Following consultation last year where residents asked why Block A was outside the larger housing renewal development area, we have brought Block A back into the proposals to ensure that it fits seamlessly into the wider scheme.

The design team from HTA have been reviewing designs in light of the revised setting in which the block will come forward; namely that Allbrook House, directly opposite the Block A site, is no longer proposed for demolition, and that the previously proposed 'village square' will be relocated to enable



a landmark community building to be built at the entrance to the estate.

Engagement with residents and other community and council stakeholders has begun and will continue in earnest over the upcoming months.

Alton Activity Centre and Downshire Field: Design updates

Exciting progress continues on the Alton Activity Centre and Downshire Field, with ground site investigations completed in early February 2025 to prepare for construction starting in Summer 2025.

These essential steps mark a significant milestone in the Alton Renewal Plan's journey to deliver enhanced facilities and green spaces for the community.

The design team has been working diligently to refine the proposals, drawing on invaluable feedback from the Youth Advisory Panel (YAP) to ensure the plans meet the needs and aspirations of local residents, especially younger members of the community.

At the **Alton Activity Centre**, the design focuses on creating a space that balances fun, creativity,

and inclusivity. Play equipment is being upgraded to offer modern, engaging features for children of all ages and abilities. The new layout includes areas dedicated to younger children as well as dynamic spaces for older youth to enjoy. Thoughtful details, such as sensory play zones and shaded seating, aim to create an environment that is welcoming and accessible to families and caregivers.

Downshire Field, a treasured green space at the heart of the Alton Estate, will undergo a transformation to enhance its usability, while maintaining its natural charm. Pathways are being redesigned to provide step-free access, allowing all members of the community to enjoy the field with ease. The addition of informal play areas, seamlessly integrated into the landscape, will encourage exploration and creativity. New planting schemes, designed to boost biodiversity and create a more sustainable environment, will further enrich this beloved space.

Both projects reflect a commitment to sustainability, accessibility, and community-focused design. By addressing key aspects such as play spaces, pathways, and green areas, the enhancements aim to foster a stronger sense of community and create spaces where everyone feels welcome.

We look forward to breaking ground this summer and will keep you updated as work progresses.



Youth Advisory Panel Workshop: February/March Highlights and What's Next

The Youth Advisory Panel (YAP) remains an integral part of the Alton Renewal Plan, ensuring that young voices are at the heart of shaping our community's future.

In February, the YAP gathered for an engaging workshop focusing on the finer details of the Alton Renewal Plan. YAP members came together for their third interactive session, to provide invaluable feedback on the proposed layouts, public spaces, and community facilities. The March workshop offered a platform for attendees to share their perspectives on the proposals for Block A, ensuring the designs - particularly for the youth spaces - reflect the needs and aspirations of the younger community.

We were inspired by the creativity and passion shown by our young advisors and are incorporating their input into the ongoing design process.

The next workshop, scheduled for May, will delve into the technical details of the designs for the Alton Activity Centre and Downshire Field. This session will also provide an



opportunity for participants to share their final thoughts as we move closer to the implementation phase of these projects.

Unveiling of the Restored Bull Statue

The famous Grade II* listed bronze Bull statue by Robert Clatworthy has been restored to its former glory by Heritage of London Trust (HOLT), in collaboration with the Alton Renewal Team. 'Bull' was originally installed on Downshire Field in 1961, at the request of the Alton Estate's architects.



On a crisp, bright, winter's morning in late November, residents of Roehampton came along to see the results of the restoration and listen to beautiful poetry written especially for the occasion by pupils of Roehampton Church Forest School. The Mayor of Wandsworth, Cllr Sana Jafri, and a student from The Alton School, Jeremiah, unveiled the shiny new bull; much to everyone's delight.

Afterwards, guests were invited to the Alton Arts Hub to enjoy a delicious Spanish-themed buffet, and a raffle draw to win a cuddly, soft bull.

Alton Estate Regeneration Update

We've been busy with HTA Design over the past few months, developing plans for the Alton estate. The focus has been around three key areas: Danebury Avenue neighbourhood, the existing site of 166/168 Roehampton Lane, and Portswood Place.

Firstly, we welcomed the community to our 'Designing Danebury' sessions in November and December. Those sessions looked at opportunities for new retail, new homes, and public realm improvements in the form of a public square on the existing location of the Allbrook carpark.

In February, the team organised an invitation-only event at the Alton Arts Hub, which provided those residents living in the proposed demolition area an opportunity to speak to the team in more detail about the emerging plans. This drop-in enabled conversations around resident concerns, but also the merits of the proposals from the perspective of those most directly affected.

On 1 March, we invited the community to the Family Hub, to look at the past, present and future projects of the Alton Renewal Plan. It provided a chance to learn more about the emerging proposals for the site of 166/168 Roehampton



Lane and the Portswood Place neighbourhood, in addition to the developing proposals for Danebury Avenue. Scale models of the proposals were particularly popular amongst the attendees, helping them to understand the plans in the context of the existing area.

On 5 March, we hosted a public drop-in at Roehampton Library for residents who couldn't attend the previous sessions to see the emerging plans for the Alton and help share the future of housing, shops, community and open spaces on the estate. A copy of the exhibition boards displayed at these sessions can be downloaded from the Alton websites (see front cover).

Further consultation and engagement will follow in the coming months as opportunities are developed. Please keep an eye on our media channels, noticeboards and weekly information stall for more information. We will also continue to update our display boards in the library, and feedback comment cards are available there too.

Your feedback is invaluable in helping to shape a preferred option, which will be subject to a resident ballot, on target to run in late 2025. In the meantime, please keep your thoughts and comments coming!

Homes for Wandsworth programme update



Proposals for land adjacent to Farnborough House:

Since achieving Planning Approval in 2024, the design teams have been busy developing the construction design and enabling works packages, to allow the start of the diversion works of existing services (BT/Fibre, gas & electricity) in and around the site, which has started and will be ongoing.

We are currently undertaking a tender process to find a suitable, skilled, main contractor to deliver the new scheme.

Our target date for starting on site is by early autumn 2025.





Proposals for land at Bessborough Road:

As with our Farnborough House scheme, our design team have been busy developing the construction design and we are now undertaking a tender process to find an experienced, specialist, main contractor to deliver the new scheme and wider works.

Our target date for starting on site is by early summer 2025.

Once the above tenders are completed and we have decided on the main contractor for each scheme, we will be writing to residents again to update on the next steps, including when we will be holding 'Meet the Contractor' events.

Alton Renewal Plan in action - Neighbourhood







You said...

You wanted improved estate management, open space to be protected, and to feel safer.

We have...

Repaired roads and pavements

We have been mending roads and pavements across the Alton estate where they need the most attention.

Worked with local community groups and stakeholders to identify and develop plans to address concerns about community safety, including:

 completing an estate walkabout with the Roehampton Safer Neighbourhood Team, Wandsworth Housing team, and the Designing Out Crime Officer to plan for safer communal spaces

- attending the SW15 Women's Network White Ribbon Walk to help raise awareness around male violence against women and girls
- holding monthly meetings with Wandsworth Housing, the Roehampton Safer Neighbourhood Team and Community Safety to discuss priority addresses and individuals
- recruiting a new dedicated Community Safety Support Officer, Leo Bunting, who started in February and is based on the Alton Estate. The new post within the Safer and Stronger Communities Team will involve working with partners to respond to crime and anti-social behaviour issues across the Alton, supporting the wider work of the Renewal team. This will include leading on projects and initiatives such as Neighbourhood Watch, Wandsworth Business Against Crime, and regular community engagement events, in addition to bringing partners and agencies together through a joint action plan. The post will support the ongoing work of the current Community Safety Officer to build strong relationships with residents, local businesses and organisations.

And we plan...

To continue working to tackle anti-social behaviour and crime on the estate by:

- holding regular multi-agency meetings to tackle priority addresses and individuals, making use of mapping tools
- rolling out Neighbourhood Watch to residents, which is a
 great opportunity to connect with your neighbours and
 build a stronger, more resilient community, and share

- rolling out Wandsworth Business Against Crime to local businesses to improve communications, linked with Wandsworth Council and your local policing team, to deter crime and anti-social behaviour in businesses and licensed premises
- holding monthly engagement events/drop-in sessions to speak with the Community Safety team about any concerns you'd like to raise in relation to anti-social behaviour, crime and safety.

Provided a cargo bike to rent

Chantelle's Community Kitchen is the host of Wandsworth's newest community cargo bike. Cargo bikes offer an ecofriendly and efficient way to transport people and goods around the borough, and cost just £3 per hour to rent. The bike can carry up to 2 kids or 1 adult, carry all kinds of cargo ranging from furniture to food deliveries, and keeps your items dry with the rain cover provided. You can ride effortlessly with the electric assistance and travel up to 50km on a full charge. The council also offers free cargo bike training. Search 'cargo bikes' on the council website to find out more.

Set up an Access and Inclusion Steering Group

The purpose of the group is to bring together residents to discuss the accessibility of the estate currently, and to work with the design team to help shape the design development to ensure improved accessibility in the future.

The group currently includes residents who use mobility scooters/motorised wheelchairs and people with health issues.


ARP Community Drop-in

Residents' Corner

"My name is Aryaman Rawat, and I've been a resident of the Alton for the past year. After reading the autumn edition of Alton News, I felt inspired by the rapid growth taking place in our community and wanted to share how this remarkable area has profoundly influenced my creative journey.

When I moved from New Delhi to pursue a Master's in Music at Kingston University, I was nervous about what to expect from Roehampton; but it didn't take long for it to feel like home. In fact, it has become the first place I can truly call home since moving to London.

Over the past year, the serene green spaces around Petersfield Rise provided me with the focus and inspiration I needed. It's where I worked on Gapils, a Norwegian short film that premiered at Avgang '24, a prestigious film festival in Norway, and Cat-astrophic, a game for which I created music and sound design. Cat-astrophic won 'Most Polished Game' at the Kingston University Game Jam and was later showcased at Develop: Brighton 2024, the UK's largest game development event.

Whenever I felt creatively stuck, I'd hop on the free Roehampton Uni bus to Putney Bridge and walk along the Thames - it always cleared my head. On days when I got



so caught up in my work that I forgot to cook, I was saved by my generous neighbours via the food sharing app Olio. Roehampton Library became a second home, where I'd spend hours with my laptop and headphones, developing demos and sketching out song ideas. I'm incredibly grateful to the council for maintaining such an inspiring area that fosters artistic growth.

Recently, I've started giving guitar lessons and music production classes to give back to the supportive and welcoming community that has given me so much. Sharing my skills and helping others explore their creativity has been incredibly fulfilling and has strengthened my connection to this area.

Looking back, Roehampton hasn't just been a place to live - it's been a community that has shaped my creativity and made this chapter of my life so much more meaningful and memorable."
